Dutch Juniors

What a great adventure after an absence of three years principally because of the pandemic...- great to be travelling abroad for a badminton event!

Umpires had been asked to arrive in good time to attend the briefing at 9:15 pm on Tuesday 6th March. I have been on flights previously at silly o'clock in the morning, but this one was very civilised and took off shortly after 11 am. I knew where I had met the transport team on previous occasions, but I was given different instructions, and consequently there was a bit of to-ing and fro-ing in Schiphol Airport, before finding my very identifiable host driver in his bright orange sweatshirt.

A Swedish umpire and I were taken along with two or three players to our hotels. It was good to have a relaxing hour or so, before heading out with the other umpire to find somewhere for an early dinner before being collected to go to the briefing. It turned out to be a snack on a bench overlooking the sea to a rather beautiful sunset! Our hotel was in Zandvoort where the Dutch Formula One Grand Prix is held apparently.

We met our other umpire colleagues at the venue in the café overlooking the practice courts. The Dutch Junior is an extremely high-level event and it uses a dedicated badminton club which has six competition courts in one hall and practice courts in another. Such a wonderful facility! As usual, it was a mixture of old and new friends. It was going to be an extremely busy week as everyone was on duty all day every day and no benefit of line judges until the finals. That's particularly difficult in Europe as their procedure dictates that the umpire calls all lines : not the players with umpires just overruling if required. Following the briefing, we were transported back to the hotel where everyone congregated in the bar for a welcome drink together.

The week went extremely well. The Dutch Junior is one of two European events along with the German Junior which are world-class standard junior events. We had to remind ourselves on some occasions that these were technically "children" - the standard was incredible! As well as European players, there were participants from China, Japan, South Korea, Malaysia and India. On this occasion, there were no players from Scotland. As our best under 19 players are probably only 16 years old, I suspect a decision was made that this tournament would not be an appropriate one for them to attend. Maybe next year?! Many of the best players at the event played all disciplines and consequently were probably exhausted by the end of the week. Two of the finals ended in retirement unfortunately, but overall the standard of play during the week was extraordinary. It is fantastic to see young players play at such an amazing level.

All the umpires got on very well together, and it was a great team. On the Sunday evening, those of us who were unable to travel home that day went to a local beach restaurant and had a glorious meal. It was wonderful to enjoy a meal without the words "can you be back in 20 to 25 minutes" ringing in our ears!

The following morning I was returned to Schiphol Airport for my flight. I arrived home in Scotland, tired but happy : it was so good to be back on the international scene again!

Scottish players made it as far as the Qtr Finals but Chris made it as far as the Finals being awarded SJ in the WS Final. Barry and I were so "pwoud" when he was awarded his medal. We saw a few more of the sights and had some laughs and ended up walking about 7 miles around the City. It was a good tournament helped greatly by the friendly Irish hospitality.
